







Spring is finally here and things are starting to grow! Farmers are behind on their field work already due to the harsh winter and cold ground. Keep on the lookout for slow moving vehicles on the roads. They are out there and will be for while until all crops have been planted. Please give them a break and drive with caution while around them. We have easier control of our personal autos then they can at times with those big tractors.

A lot has happened in the world of Agriculture since I last wrote you. The biggest issue that is hurting everyone or will be hurting everyone is the Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea or PEDv. I am sure most everyone has heard of this as it has been in the news for a number of months now as the virus continues to spread throughout the United States. If you haven't heard about this, it is only a virus that pigs can get and can't be transferred to humans. The only problem that humans will see is the higher prices in the grocery store on pork. When PEDv is introduced into a farm, the illness rate is close to 100 percent on newborn or very young pigs. A total of 26 States and Canada are listing cases to varying degrees. Not all hog farmers are seeing this virus as they are isolated enough and do not have a large traffic of "outside" transportation on their farms. PEDv is easily transmitted with contamination linked to transportation as well. Cont'd on page 4




I would like to hear from you on any events or happenings at your Grange or in your community you are involved with, to

**LITTLE KNOWN FACTS ABOUT MICHIGAN**

1. Michigan has more than 11,000 inland lakes and more than 36,000 miles of streams.
2. Michigan has 116 lighthouses and navigational lights. Seul Choix Point Lighthouse in Gulliver has been guiding ships since 1895. The working light also functions as a museum, which houses early 1900's furnishings and maritime artifacts.
3. Want some magic?? Go to Colon, it's the home of the world's largest manufacturer of magic supplies.
4. The largest village in Michigan is Caro.
5. In 1817 the University of Michigan was the first university Established by any of the states. It was founded by priests. Originally named Catholepistemian and located in Detroit, the name was changed in 1821. The university moved to Ann Arbor in 1841.
6. Standing anywhere in the state a person is within 85 miles of one of the Great Lakes.
7. In 1879 Detroit telephone customers were first in the nation to be assigned phone numbers to facilitate handling calls.
8. The Upper Michigan Copper Country is the largest commercial deposit of native copper in the world.
9. Michigan is the only place in the world with a floating post office. The J. W. Westcott II is the only boat in the world that delivers mail to ships while they are still underway. They have been operating for 125 years.
10. Michigan State University has the largest single campus student body of any Michigan University. It is one of the largest institutions in the country. It was the first institution of higher learning in the nation to teach scientific agriculture.
11. Michigan is first in the United States production of peat and magnesium compounds and second in gypsum and iron ore.
12. Forty of the state's 83 counties adjoin at least one of the Great Lakes.
13. Michigan was the first sate to provide in its Constitution for the establishment of public libraries.

14. Michigan was the first state to guarantee every child the right to tax-paid high school education.
15. Four flags have flown over Michigan—French, English, Spanish, and United States.

We are using this issue of the Grange News as a reminder to Community Service Chairman, both new and old, on how to organize the notebook.

**Simplify the Notebook!**

Select the photos that best represent the project

If 30 pictures are taken of a project, does not mean all 30 need to be used!

**Organize the Notebook**

You want your notebook to read like a book

Keep projects grouped together

Keep supporting evidence, such as thank you letters and newspaper articles, with the photo and text of the project

**Examples of Organizing**

Organize the book in 2 separate sections:

New Projects & Continuing Projects

Organize each section in chronological order from beginning of Grange year to the end

OR – Organize each section in order from largest project in terms of hours involved to smallest project

Keep the pages clean & concise

List all projects at the beginning of the book

Try to keep 2 pages of a project as a 2 page spread, so the judge can see they go together

May have to go to 3 or 4 pages, depending on the project

Do not use tabs with paper inserts – they fall out!

If a donation was made to a project, make sure it is listed somewhere.

Just a reminder that the Community Service program period is September 1, 2013 to August 31, 2014. Notebooks/reports will be due September 10. More information to come in the next Grange News. Please contact us if you have any questions.

As we've finally turned the corner on our cold Winter and started to see some signs of Spring, this seems like an appropriate time to think about the new beginnings that come from life-long education and personal growth. The Michigan State Grange Foundation has a core purpose of developing our members

to the highest potential, expressing that purpose through support of our Lecturer's program and through our Student Loan Program. These activities maintain a clear focus on building skills and knowledge, across the Grange community and the broader society within which we live and work. Through the expression of these fundamental principles, we hope that we are working to build a better world in which we will live, and which we will leave to our children and our children's children.

As we examine the requests for support that we receive, either from MSG Directors or Loan applicants, we look to assure that they show the appropriate promise for our community, and that they are aligned with the by-laws and documents of incorporation of the State Grange Foundation.

The majority of the time, we approve the requests submitted to us, as they fit clearly within our educational focus and represent good investments in the future of our society.

Although we have sometimes seen challenges in securing Loan repayment, we've worked ardently over the past several years, to strengthen both the documents associated with those loans and the relationships that we have with loan recipients. This has paid dividends in recent years, as we've seen a clear increase in the level of communication between our Board and the learners that we are supporting through their education. This has been true for both "traditional" students transitioning directly from high school to college, and for "non-traditional" students who are focused on continued education, as a life-long endeavor. As a result, we feel strongly that our program has continued to grow in a way that will make it sustainable into the future.

The Foundation Board has also worked to maintain the quality of our investments, often through our own continued education. We've sought out input on the distribution of our funds, from multiple financial advisors and institutions. This has led us to rebalance our approach to the growth of the financial health of the Foundation, in order to assure its longevity and vitality. While that may not end up being the most engaging aspect of the Foundation, it is critical to ensuring that our desire to educate and build is sustained for generations to come. As such, we take our fiduciary responsibilities extremely seriously. As a result, the improved approach taken about a year ago has yielded significant return on our investment, particularly as compared to those we would have seen, had we not sought out new strategies.

As always, the Board is very grateful for all of the support provided by Grangers around the State of Michigan. We look forward to our interactions with each of you, whether they be related to donations made to honor friends or family members, or related to your growth through structured educational programs. We believe that the strength of our society is closely tied to the thirst for knowledge and natural curiosity that seems to define us. As such, we see that our Foundation plays an important part in the future that we are all working to create.
